

not(n't) + any

- There aren't any cars in the car park.
- Sally and Steve haven't got any children.
- You can have some coffee but I don't want any.

no + noun (no cars / no garden etc.)

no ... = not + any or not + a:

- There are **no cars** in the car park. (= there are**n't any** cars)
- We've got no coffee. (= we haven't got any coffee)
- It's a nice house but there's **no garden**. (= there is**n't a** garden)

We use no ... especially after have (got) and there is/are.

 $negative \ verb + \mathbf{any} = positive \ verb + \mathbf{no}$:

- They haven't got any children. or They've got no children. (not 'They haven't got no children')
- There isn't any sugar in your coffee. or There's no sugar in your coffee.
- B no and none

Use **no** + noun (**no money** / **no children** etc.):

- We've got no money.
- Everything was OK. There were no problems.

Use **none** alone (without a noun):

- 'How much money have you got?' 'None.' (= no money)
- 'Were there any problems?' 'No, **none**.' (= no problems)
- C none and no-one

 $\mathbf{none} = 0 \text{ (zero)}$

None is an answer for How much? / How many? (things or people):

- 'How much money have you got?' 'None.' (= no money)
- 'How many people did you meet?' 'None.' (= no people)

 $\mathbf{no-one} = \text{nobody} (\Rightarrow \text{Unit 77})$

No-one is an answer for **Who?**:

• 'Who did you meet?' 'No-one.' (or Nobody.)

- 'What did you say?' 'Nothing.'






